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


Fig.5. THE OUTHOUSE IN STONE HORSE PARK












Fig.14. NORTH LEYBERRYS

#### EXPLANATORY NOTE ON THE GRAPHS

The six following graphs illustrate certain trends in the growth and decline of the business of the Partners, discussed on pages 58-61 of Vol. I. A, B, D and E are logarithmic; CI and C2 are drawn on a natural scale. A, B, C and E are divided into account periods listed on page 49 of Vol. I, since these irregular periods are more significant than a monthly or yearly scale. For reference purposes however the years are indicated in a scale at the top of the page. Graph D is calibrated in months only, since the bills for sharpening tools were detailed and totalled monthly.

Graph A shows the profitability of the business over the whole period of twenty five years. The first four accounts (RH1-4), covering 1742-46, are taken together. During that period Ralph Hutchinson recorded a total expenditure by the Partners of £785/2/2. In 1746 they received £2,383/19/9 for the sale of copper and ore already mined and smelted (£1,688/-/1 for copper and £695/19/8 for ore). As the production of five years was all sold at once the profit of £1,598/17/6½ is averaged out over the sixty months of these four account sheets. Similarly in the four year period covered by RH 5-8 (1747-50) a balance of £998/2/8 is left when the expenditure of £1,009/3/9 is subtracted from the income of £2,007/6/7 from the sale of ore plus millage charges. This is also shown as a monthly average over that forty-eight month period. (see Vol. I, page 59). In RH 9 and all subsequent accounts (except the missing RH 10) it is possible to balance income against expenditure in each period. It is significant that only in one period (RH 11) did the Partners make a dead loss.


Graph B shows a simple monthly average of production within each account period.


Graph C illustrates the amount of deadwork done, removing stone and soil without any production of ore. Cl shows this as a percentage of total costs in comparison with the cost of ore-getting and all other expenditure. Graph C2 shows the actual cost of deadwork. Both show a great increase in such unproductive work compared with more profitable effort. These graphs only cover the period of direct working in RH 1-12.


Graph D covers only a short period but shows the number of points sharpened by the local blacksmith, and detailed on vouchers which he submitted. The more deadwork the more jumpers and picks blunted.


Graph E shows the average price per ton (of 21 cwt.) at which the ore sold, in each period. During the years from the agreement with Cooper (see Vol.I, page 56) to the end of direct working, the Partners received a fixed price of £28 per ton. After that the mines were leased and the price was free to fluctuate. The graph shows a general downward trend to RH 17, but a revival in RH 19 and a maintenance of a high price thereafter.


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FOUR HORSE PUMPING ENGINE




Fig.17. THE BOB WALL






Fig. 20. SITE OF WASHERIES



#### APPENDIX A

### THE HARTLEY-KEARSLEY LEASE, 1738

This indenture was made the Eighteenth day of December in the Twelfth year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Second by the Grace of God of Great Britain ffrance and Ireland King Defender of the Faith and in the year of our Lord One Thousand Seven Hundred and Thirty Eight BETWEEN Leonard Hartley of Middleton Tyas in the County of York Esquire of the one part and Oliver Kearsley of Sedgefield in the County of Durham Gentleman of the otherpart WITNESSETH that for and in consideration of the covenants payments provisions and agreements hereinafter in these presents mentioned expressed and reserved on the part and behalf of the said Oliver Kearsley his Executors Administrators and Assignes to be paid done and performed and for diverse other good causes and considerations him the said Leonard Hartley hereunto moving the said Leonard Hartley hath Demised Granted and to ffarm letten and by these presents DOTH Demise Grant and to ffarm lett unto the said Oliver Kearsley etc. ALL these his mines of Cole, Lead ore, Copper, Tinn, Allom and other Minerals as well opened as not opened lying being and remaining within and under which can shall or may be had sought digged won wrought obtained and gotten within forth and out of All or any of the lands grounds fields and premises of the said Leonard Hartley situate lying and being within the Township or Manor of Middleton Tyas aforesaid (EXCEPT one field) or close called Stonehorse Park South of the Schoolhouse commonly Pasture and the Park adjoining the same comonly Meadow and one little Park or Paddock called Water Close Park) and now in the possession of him the said Leonard Hartley his undertenants or assignes and for the purpose aforesaid to digg Sink Work and make Pitt and Pitts Trench and Trenches and drive Drift and Drifts Watergates and Watercourses or other works whatsoever in any part or parts of the said Lands and Grounds (except before excepted) as well for the Winning Working Obtaining and getting of Cole, Lead ore, Copper, Tinn, Allom, and other Minerals forth and out of the said Mines as for Avoiding and Coursing away water as the said Oliver Kearsley etc. shall from time to time think fit and convenient and the said Ores and Minerals there found and all the Stones Earth Rubbish and other Refuse which shall from time to time be raised digged and brought above ground out of any of the said Mines Pitts or Groves or other Works as aforesaid to lay upon the grounds nearest the Mines Pitts and other places where the same shall be digged and raised as shall be most convenient and the same to Spall, try, wash, Pick, dress and make fitt for Smelting and Refining at his and their own Costs and Charges and the said Ores and Minerals so Spalled, Tryed and dressed and after the same shall be Smelted, Refined and Weighed and his part or Share thereof hereinafter mentioned to be excepted and reserved and to be laid out for the said Leonard Hartley his Heirs and Assignes as hereunder is expressed to have taken carry away and convert to his and their own proper use and uses without any Account to be made or given for the same and also full and free power and Authority to make place erect and sett up within or upon any of the Lands and grounds aforesaid (except before excepted) All such Milnes Engines Smeltinghouses Stonehouses Hovells Lodges Shedds or other Works as shall from time to time be needful and convenient for the working managing and carrying on the work of the said mines with liberty of Egress Regress to and for the said Oliver Kearsley etc and his or their Servants or Workmen at all times during the Term hereunder mentioned with horses carts and carriages to and from the same (EXCEPT and always reserved out of this present Grant unto the said Leonard Hartley etc One full and equal Eighth part of Share ( the whole into Eight equal parts to be divided) of and in the said Ores and Minerals which shall arise be digged and gotten within forth or out of any the land grounds or places aforesaid or any part of parts thereof after the same are Spalled

tyed washed picked dressed Smelted and Refined and made merchantable free of and from all Charges for raising Smelting or Refining the same otherwise for and in lieu of his and their Toll and farm and to be had and taken by the said Leonard Hartley his Heirs and Assignes in Such manner as hereafter is mentioned) TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the said mines as well open as not opened and all and singular other the liberties powers and Priviliges above in and by these presents demised and Granted or mentioned or intended so to be and every part and parcell thereof (except before excepted) of and in the said Oliver Kearsley etc. from the second day of January next ensuing the date hereof for and during and unto the end and term of Twenty One Years from thence next ensuing fully to be compleat and ended YEILDING AND DELIVERING therefore unto the said Leonard Hartley his heirs or Assignes the said one full Eighth part or share (the whole into Eight equal parts to be divided) hereinbefore excepted and received of all the said Cole Ores and Minerals which shall from time to time during the said Term be gotten whithin forth and out of all or any the Mine or Mines to be digged won wrought obtained and gotten within all or any the premises above demised and in such manner as hereunder in that behalf is mentioned AND the said Oliver Kearsley in consideration of the Lease hereby made for himself his heirs Executors and Administrators doth Covenant promise grant and Agree to and with the said Leonard Hartley his heirs and Assignes by those presents in manner following (that is to say) That from time to time during the Term hereby granted when and as often as One Ton of Cole, Lead Ore, Copper, Tinn and other Minerais shall be digged raised and brought above ground out of any the lands or grounds aforesaid he the said Oliver Kearsley etc. or his or their agents shall and will at his and their own proper costs and charges spall try wash pick dress smelt refine and make the same fitt for Markett and cause the same to be duely weighed and entry thereof to be made in a Book for that purpose to be kept by his and their Agents at the works of the said mines which shall and may at all times during the said term be perused by the said Leonard Hartley etc. and after the same shall be so dressed smelted refined and made fitt for Markett and duely weighed as aforesaid shall and will deliver or cause to be delivered unto the said Leonard Hartley etc. the said full eighth part of share thereof hereinbefore received to his and their own proper use free and clear of and from all costs charges and expenses whatsoever AND further shall and will give unto the said Leonard Hartley etc. or his or their Agents three days Notice of every Division or weighing of all such Cole, Lead Ore, Copper, Tinn and other Minerals before the same shall be divided and weighed from time to time during the said Term which shall be so always smelted refined weighed and divided when One Ton shall be raised and gotten as aforesaid AND further that the said Oliver Kearlsey etc. shall and will use his and their best and utmost endeavours for the effectual winning working and carrying out of the works of the said mines and work of the same fairly and orderly leaving sufficient walls and Pillars to support and uphold the Roofe thereof from falling in AND that he the said Oliver Kearsley etc. shall and will from time to time during the said Term cause to be kept oen or more Book or Books of Accounts of all the quantities and produce of all such Cole, Ores, and Minerals as shall be gotten within forth and out of all or any the Mines and premises above demised and wherein shall be made an Entry of the weight of all such Ores and Minerals after the same shall be washed and dressed before the smelting thereof and also after the same shall be Smelted Refined and made fitt for Markett which said Book or Books of Accounts shall from time to time be made and kept by some proper person employed in the working or managing the Works of the said Mines and that he the said Oliver Kearsley etc. shall and will at the Pitts or Smeltinghouses of or belonging to the said Mines monthly if thereunto required by the said Leonard Hartley his heirs or Assignes during the Term hereby demised produce and show forth or cause to be

produced and shown forth unto the said Leonard Hartley his heirs Agents or Assignes demanding the same the several and respective Book or Books of Accounts which from time to time shall be kept and given by the person employed for that purpose as aforesaid and also give and deliver or cause to be given and delivered unto the said Leonard Hartley his Heirs Agents or Assignes demanding the same true copies of all such Books of Accounts the several copies and Books of Accounts of such working produce smelting and refining to be signed and subscribed by the person or persons making and keeping such Book or Books so that the working and neat produce of the said mine may be the more easily and better discovered and ascertained AND that to the end the said Leonard Hartley his heirs and Assignes may the better be informed and satisfied of the fair and orderley working of the said Mines and of the fair and just keeping of such Books of Accounts it shall and may be lawfull to and for the said Leonard Hartley his heirs or Assignes or any viewer or viewers or other person or persons skillfull in mineing by him or them to be for that purpose employed or appointed at all or any time or times during the term hereby granted at his and their wills and pleasures to enter into all or any the Smeltinghouses Milnes or other works belonging to the said Mines also to ride and descend by the ropes and engines used by the said Oliver Kearsley etc. at the demised premises into all or any the Pitts or Shafts of or belonging to the said Mines and to view and inspect the working of the same, thereby the better to be informed of the due and regular course of working thereof AND also he the said Oliver Kearsley etc. shall and will at the end and expiration or other sooner determination of the said term above granted give yeild and deliver up to the said Leonard Hartley his heirs or Assignes quiet and peaceable possession of all and singular the premises above demised AND further also that he the said Oliver Kearsley etc. shall and will from time to time half yearly during the said term hereby granted pay and satisfye unto the said Leonard Hartley his heirs and Assignes all such Damage and Satisfaction for Spoil of ground Grass or Corn as shall or may happen to be made or done by reason or meanes of breaking ground setting up Milnes houses Engines making Pitts Drifts Watercourses or other works to be used in or about the winning owrking or carrying out of the works of the said Mines as by Robert Steaney of Middleton Tyas aforesaid Gentleman William Peacock of the same place Gentleman and Richard Coates of the same place Yeoman shall from time to time half yearly ajudge reasonable under their hands in writing the same to be paid within Twenty Days after demand thereof made the said Robert Steaney William Peacock and Richard Coates being three indifferent persons hereby appointed as well on the part and behalf of the said Leonard Hartley his heirs and Assignes as on the part and behalf of the said Oliver Kearsley etc. and in case of the death of the said Robert Steaney William Peacock and Richard Coates before the end of the said term hereby granted then and in such case the said Oliver Kearsley etc. shall and will from time to time and in like manner pay half yearly to the said Leonard Hartley his heirs and Assignes all such damages for spoil of ground as aforesaid as by three other indifferent persons (to be chosen and appointed by the said Leonard Hartley his heirs and Assignes) shall be ajudged reasonable the first half yearly payment for such damage to be made at the end of six Kalendar months next after the said Oliver Kearsley etc. shall begin to work or break ground in any part of the said demised premises AND the said Leonard Hartley for himself his heirs Executors and Administrators doth Covenant promise and Agree to with the said Oliver Kearsley etc. by these presents in manner following (that is to say) that it shall and may be lawfull to and for the said Oliver Kearsley etc. paying doing and performing all and every the Covenants promises and agreements in by these presents reserved and agreed on his and their parts to be payed observed done and performed from time to time during the said term of Twenty One Years by force and virtue of these presents peaceably and quietly to have hold use occupy possess and enjoy all and every of the

said Mine and Mines above granted and every part thereof without the lett suit hindrance of disturbance of the said Leonard Hartley his heirs and Assignes or any other person or persons lawfully claiming to claim by from or under him or them AND also it shall and may be lawfull to and for the said Oliver Kearsley etc. at any time or times within six Kalendar Months next after the end or other sooner determination of this present Grant to take carry carry away and enjoy to his and their own proper use or uses all: and every the Coles, Lead Ore, Copper, Tinn and other Minerals which shall be then lying at the Milne or Smeltinghouses of or belonging to the said Mines hereby granted, the said eighth part of share thereof after the same shall be Smelted and Refined as aforesaid herein before referred to the said Leonard Hartley his heirs and Assignes and the Limestones only excepted AND also shall and will at the end or sooner determination of the present Grant permitt and suffer the said Oliver Kearsley etc. to remove and take away he or they having first paid or satisfied to the said Leonard Hartley his heirs and Assignes all such damage for spoil of ground as aforesaid or to be occassioned by leaving of any heaps of rubbish or earth upon the said premises or otherwise howsoever as by the said three persons shall be ajuged reasonable and not otherwise all such Milnes Engines and other implements and materials whatsoever then being upon the hereby demised premises without the lawfull lett suit and interuption or disturbance of the said Leonard Hartley his heirs or Assignes or any other persons lawfully claiming by from or under him or them PROVIDED always these presents are on this condition and it is hereby declared and agreed by and between the said parties for themselves their heirs Executors Administrators or Assignes that in case the said Oliver Kearsley etc. shall at any time give six Kalendar Months notice in writing to the said Leonard Hartley his heirs or Assignes of his or their desire or intention to quit or leave the said Mines or premises hereby granted and to deliver up the same his or their interest therein and thereof, or if the said Oliver Kearsley etc. shall neglect or refuse effectually to work the said Mines or to make trial for the discovery of some mine or mines of Cole, Lead Ore, Copper Tinn or other Minerals within some part or parts of the said hereby granted premises for the space of six Kalendar Months together at any time during the said term unless hindered by extremity of water or in dressing smelting refining and making fitt for markett the said ores and minerals or shall neglect or refuse to lay out and deliver unto the said Leonard Hartley his heirs or Assignes the said eighth part of share of the said Cole, Ores and Minerals hereby reserved as aforesaid from time to time when and as often as the same shall be divided and weighed during the said term or neglect or refuse to give notice unto the said Leonard Hartley his heirs or Assignes three days before every division or weighing of the said Ores and Minerals or shall take and carry away any of the said Cole, Ores or Minerals before such division and part laid out and notice given as aforesaid during the said term, or if the said Oliver Kearsley etc. do or shall at any time during the said term grant bargain sell assigne demise lett sett do away or depart with this present Lease And premises hereby granted or any part thereof to any person or persons whatsoever for all or any part of the said term hereby granted or at any time or times during the said term joyne or take in any partner or partners for the working managing or carrying out of the works of the said mines without the special lycence consent agreement of the said Leonard Hartley his heirs or Assignes in that behalf first had and obtained in writing then and in such case for all any or either of the causes aforesaid the present grant and every article clause matter and thing therein contained shall cease determine and be utterly void to all intents and purposes and then and in such case for any or either of the causes aforesaid it shall and may be lawfull to and for the said Leonard Hartley his heirs and Assignes into all and singular the premises hereby granted to re-enter and the same to lease

again retain and repossess and enjoy as in his and their former Estate any herein contained to the contrary in all and anywise notwithstanding PROVIDED also that it shall be may be lawfull for the said Leonard Hartley his heirs and Assignes at all times during the said term hereby granted to take and carry away from all and every pitts or bank topps of or belonging to the said mines all such limestones as shall from time to time be raised and gotten within forth be absolutely necessary for erecting milns courses engines or other works to be used in or about the winning working or carrying out the works of the said mines anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise not withstanding IN WITNESS whereof the said parties to these presents have hereunto interchangeably set their hands and seals this day and year first above written.

#### APPENDIX B

CASE : D'ARCY AND PARTNERS v HARTLEY

The Lady D'Arcy, John Yorke Esq., John Hutton Esq., and the children of Mrs Jessop are seized of an estate at Middleton Tyas in the County of York, in which estate there is a copper mine or vein of copper car which the proprietors have for some years past worked, and raised and got thereout several quantities of copper car; and there are no other mines or works save this anywhere in that neighbourhood. The proprietors have received information several times of several quantities or parcells of copper car being at different times stolen and conveyed away in the night time or otherwise secretly from the said mine, but were never able to discover or find out the persons who so stole and conveyed away the same, till about the 6th of July last, and on that day one Robert Grainger of Barton came before Sir Ralph Milbank Baronet (one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the North Riding of the said County of York) and made an Information upon cath in the words following viz.

"The Information of Robert Grainger of Barton taken upon oath before me the 6th day of July 1742 who saith that he hath been employed by Mr Hartley of Middleton Tyas for some years past and saith that he has been frequently sent by the said Mr Hartley to purchase copper oar of Christ. Dinsdale of Middleton Tyas aforesaid, which copper oar the said Robert Grainger saith that Christ. Dinsdale got in a field near the limekilns which William Coats farms of Lady D'Arcy. And further informeth that the said Robert Grainger paid Christopher Dinsdale three pounds, twelve shillings for copper oar which he conveyed into a stable in Mr Hartley's Stone House Park, and some time afterwards Robert Grainger removed the said oar by Mr Hartley's order into his garden where he believes the said oar still remains covered under ground, and further saith not."

On the 6th day of July after taking the above Information the said Sir Ralph Milbank together with the Chief Constable went to the said Mr Hartley's house at Middleton Tyas aforesaid to search for the said oar in a particular place or corner of the said Mr Hartley's kitchin garden (which the said Grainger had described) found a pretty large quantity of copper oar bury'd and cancelled under ground which was then dug up. And in a particular place and corner of another garden or orchard of the said Mr Hartley's found another parcell or quantity of copper oar also bury'd and concealed there which was likewise dug up; and another parcell and quantity of copper oar was also found concealed in the said Mr Hartley's house in a little room over the passage near the kitchin door into which said room there was an entrance by a private trapdoor, over which trapdoor a Tubb was set when the said Sir Ralph Milbank and the Constable came to make the said search; the oar found in the 3 several places was together about a Tunn in quantity which was removed to the Constable's house who now has the same to produce. Afterwards the said Grainger made a further Information upon oath before the said Sir Ralph Milbank on the 13th of August 1742 as follows viz.

"The further Information of Robert Grainger of Barton taken before me upon oath this 13th day of August 1742, who saith that the contents and substance his former Information taken the 6th day of July last and which was read over to him this day is true save that the copper oar therein mentioned to have been purchased by this Informant of Christ. Dinsdale as therein is also mentioned and for which he paid the sums of £5/1s and of £5/12s as therein is set forth, was bought by him this Informant by the order of Mr Leonard Hartley of Middleton Tyas. For that the said Mr Hartley gave this Informant at two several times £1/1s and 20s and this Informant

laid out of his own pocket 20s more which this Informant never afterwards received from the said Hartley, who promised him this Informant that he should be a sharer with him the said Hartley on the sale and disposal of the said oar; saith that about 5 years ago when the report was that there was a copper vein discovered in a limestone quarry in a field farmed by William Coats of the Right Hble. Lady D'Arcy in the Township of Middleton Tyas aforesaid. He this Informant found in and about that quarry a piece of the said oar which he apprehending to be such carry'd to the said Mr Hartley his then master to let him see the same, who then told this Informant it was very good oar, and knowing that the same quarry was then wrought and the oar raised by one Christ. Dinsdale the said Mr Hartley ordered this Informant to apply directly to the said Dinsdale and know whether he would sell him this Informant all the oar he then raised which the said Dinsdale then agreed to; and having acquainted his said then Master Mr Hartley therewith, he gave this Informant two little sacks or pokes (which this Informant believes the said Mr Hartley had made himself for the purpose) and the key of a little out house in the Stone House Park with orders to carry and lodge the said oar there, which at different times and in the night when it was dark this Informant accordingly did and the quantity of the said oar so removed and lodged by him in the said house might to the best of his remembrance and belief amount to about six horse load. Saith that the said oar laid in the said house for 5 or 6 weeks during which time the said Mr Hartley along with this Informant went to see the same several times at some or one of which times the said Mr Hartley having perceived or apprehended that some parts of the said oar had been taken away out of an airhole in the said house, the said Mr Hartley himself stopp'd the same with which he cut and got for that purpose: that some little time after to prevent all or the remaining part of the said oar being taken away from the place aforesaid the said Mr Hartley gave this Informant orders to remove the same and for that purpose to take a horse and sledge, and carry and lodge the same or some parts thereof in the night time in a little partition under the henhouse in the back court adjoining to the said Mr Hartley's Dwelling house which this Informant accordingly did and the same was there locked up by a hang lock which he the said Mr Hartley gave and delivered to this Informant to hangthereon and that the key thereof was imediately after deliver'd by him to the said Mr Hartley. Saith that the said Mr Hartley had more oar (raised from the place aforesaid) carryed by William Coats Tenant of the said limestone quarry and Christopher Pattinson of Middleton Tyas aforesaid and by them by the Order of the said Mr Hartley lodged and put in the said Mr Hartley's summerhouse Saith that the said Mr Hartley (having some time after use or occasion for the said cellar) ordered and directed this Informant to remove the said oar thereout and hide and conceal the same in some convenient part or place of his the said Mr Hartley's gardens, that he removed the same accordingly and hid and concealed it therein, by covering the same in the manner and likeness of a hot bed. And saith that the said oar so lodged and concealed in the places aforesaid remained and continued there till the same was found on search made for that purpose. And saith that the agreement made by him with the said Dinsdale for the copper oar as above mentioned was very private and secret and that without the privity or knowledge of the said Coats the Tenant of the said quarry or the proprietors thereof and the same was so understood by the said Dinsdale this Informant and the said Mr Hartley;

### MARGINAL NOTE

N.B. Hartley very well knew that the property of the mine was Lady D'Arcy's and that Dinsdale only was employed to raise limestone and had nothing to do with any copper oar that was found there

and saith that the better to colour the same and prevent the least discovery thereof the said Mr Hartley ordered and directed this Informant not to keep company or be seen with the said Dinsdale who being employed by the said Coats to raise limestone only and being suspected to have found in such working the said copper oar he the said Dinsdale as he raised the same in the day time conceal'd it amongst the stones or rubbish of the said quarry and the same lay so conceal'd till this Informant had an opportunity in the night and when no person could see to carry the same off with the manner of which as agreed to by Dinsdale and him this Informant he acquainted the said Mr Hartley. And saith that this Informant (at the time of agreeing with the said Dinsdale for the said Oar) had orders not to acquaint him that it was on the account or by the directions of the said Mr Hartley, notwithstanding which this Informant did acquaint the said Dinsdale; and that as an incouragement to this Informant to agree with the said Dinsdale for the said oar (this Informant apprehending the said Dinsdale had no right to dispose thereof) the said Mr Hartley told him this Informant that if there was a Lord of the Manor he (meaning the said Mr Hartley) was such. And that he this Informant need not trouble himself for that he would come to no harm, or expressed himselt to that or the like purpose. And also further saith that Ann Carter the said Mr Hartley's housekeeper and several others of the said Mr Hartley's servants were privy to and knew of the said oar or some parts or parcells thereof being lodged or concealed in the several places above mentioned and about the said Mr Hartley's house and gardens."

lst Question: Be pleased to consider Grainger's two Informations and the facts above stated and give your opinion lst - Whether Dinsdale is guilty of felony in raising the copper oar and concealing it in the day time, till he had an opportunity of disposing of it, or conveying it away in the night time in the manner set forth in the above Information.

Answer: The copper ore was I conceive the property of the Owner of the Estate, unless any Lease had been made of the farm and mines then open or with power of opening mines etc. and I am of opinion if Dinsdale was employ'd by Coats or others to dig limestone only, or had power to sell limestone only, that it might be felony to take the oar which he dug up there and sell it unknown to the Proprietor, and I am rather inclined to look on it as a felony, because of the privacy with which it was transacted.

2nd Question: Whether an indictment will lye against Mr Hartley for buying the said copper oar as knowing it to be stolen either under the Statute of 1st Ann cap.9 or 5th Ann cap.31, or any other Law, and whether the indictment against him should be for felony or a misdemeanour only (Dinsdale being not yet convicted of felony) or in what other manner would you advise the owners of the said mine to proceed against Dinsdale and Hartley for they are determined to prosecute them, if under the circumstances of this case you are of opinion they can maintain it.

Answer: If Hartley knew it to be stolen and yet bought it, it is as I conceive the crime mentioned in several Statutes of receiving stolen good knowing 'em to be stolen, but yet taking all the circumstances together I cannot at present think it advisable to prosecute, the reasons of which are under the next question.

3rd Question: If Dinsdale or Hartley are prosecuted, how far can Grainger

be admitted as a proper evidence against them or either

of them?

Answer: Grainger is the only witness, and 'tis clear he is an accomplice and tho' notwithstanding he may be admitted an evidence, yet Juries seldom or never find verdicts against Parties accused on the sole Testimony of an Accomplice without other strong circumstances of corroboration: now the circumstances of corroboration are the hiding the oar in secret places pursuant to his previous Information, but there is no proof of Hartley's knowing it to be brought there or ordering it to be brought or concealed so but Grainger, and there are two or three things in his Information not very consistent viz. his orders not to tell Dinsdale that it was by Hartley's orders (as supra prced.) and other indicents pretty observable in the Informations then the distance of time and no sale ever made of any part! No quantity of great value taken in 5 years! the servants of the House knowing of it as well as Hartley! are all circumstances that weaken Grainger's account so that on the whole I cannot advise either a prosecution against Dinsdale or Hartley till. after the rule moved for last term is at an end one way or the other.

Whereas the above named John Yorke Andrew Wilkinson and John Hutton for and in consideration of the sum of Twenty Eight Pounds Ten Shillings to be paid as is here undermentioned for every Tunn of Copper Ore which shall be got by them at Middleton Tyas near Richmond in the County of York and delivered to the Order of the said Gilbert Cooper hath bargained and sold and by these presents doth bargain and sell to the said John Rotton for the use of the said Gilbert Cooper One Hundred Tunn of Copper Ore provided their Mine at Middleton Tyas will yield or produce so much to be delivered in such quantitys as they can conveniently get and as often as the said John Gilbert shall require it and first send cash for it and the said John Yorke Andrew Wilkinson and John Hutton doth covenant promise and agree that the said John Gilbert Cooper shall have the use of the Copper Miln at Middleton Tyas to smelt or Runn all such quantitys of Ore as they shall deliver him he paying One Shilling and Six pence a Tunn for all he shall smelt and that the said John Gilbert Cooper shall have the Tools belonging the Miln and the Coals and other materials now lying there paying the full price they cost or such a sum as persons skilled in such matters shall think reasonable.

In consideration of which agreement the said John Rotton by the power and authority given him by the said John Gilbert Cooper doth for himself as well as for the said John Gilbert Cooper hereby covenant promise and agree to pay to the above named John Yorke Andrew Wilkinson and John Hutton or to their Order the Sum of Twenty Eight pounds Ten Shillings for every Tunn of Copper Ore which shall be delivered them by the said Parties before they carry or remove the same away for and untill One Hundred Tunn be delivered if the Mine will produce it and that he will pay the Sum of One

Shilling and Sixpence for every Tunn of Copper Ore he shall runn in the said Miln and also such Sum or Sums as the Tools Coals or other Materials have cost or shall be deemed worth as above And it is also hereby agreed that the said John Gilbert Cooper shall pay for the said Ore and take it into his own Custody so often as Thirty Tunn is made ready or on failure therein the said John Yorke Andrew Wilkinson and John Hutton shall have liberty to Smelt the same in the said Miln or to sell it as often as they shall think fit, and the said John Yorke Andrew Wilkinson and John Hutton do hereby agree that they will deliver the said Ore washed in such manner as that they have now got and laying in the Copper House and in case of any difference or dispute therein to be determined by Two persons viz. one named by each party, and if they do not agree by persons indifferently chose who are skilled in such matters and the said John Rotton on behalf of the said John Gilbert Cooper and himself doth further promise and agree to keep the Miln Furnaces and other things he shall make use of in good and sufficient repair so soon as he shall have Smelted the said One Hundred Tunn or Sooner if the Mine will not produce that quantity without committing or suffering to be done any manner of waste upon the Premisses And the said John Yorke Andrew Wilkinson and John Hutton do agree to allow Twenty One Hundred Weight of Ore to each Tunn In Witness whereof the Parties above named have to these presents interchangeably Sett their Hands this Fifteenth day of October 1746

APPENDIX F - COPPERMINES OF MIDDLETON TYAS IN YORKSHIRE (1765)

Gabriel Jars; Voyages Metallurgiques (Vol.III) Pages 72-75

' (freely translated)

The mines were discovered about thrity years ago, while quarrying for limestone. Subsequent trials have been successful for several miles round about. The land where the mines have been sunk belongs to five different owners, who let it out to contractors or companies, whom they charge a royalty (or regalian right). The conditions of lease vary from place to place; for instance the Derbyshire Company made a fourteen year agreement with the Vicar, under which they pay him a sixth of the washed ore mined in their lease, over and above the £500 premium.

There are no mountains around Middleton Tyas, only small hills consisting of almost horizontal beds of limestone, the upper layers heavily fossilized and the lower cut by irregular veins of spar. It is in these beds, at different depths, that 'kidneys' of ore are found in cavities of varying sizes, filled with iron-stained sand. From them are obtained mountain green ore, white ore, vitreous ore, pigeon-throat ore mixed with soft green ore, and occasionally yellow ore, but not often.

The custom is for the ore to be won by working partnerships, with whom the companies agree on a wage, fitting them out with all necessary tools, giving them permission to prospect and dig at will in their stint. Because of the occurence of the ore the workings are very irregular, all one sees are little pits, 3'6" square, with galleries opening off to right and left. As soon as they strike water they stop work until there is a drought. Indeed they are more like fox-earths than mines, but one cannot blame the miners who must avoid all unnecessary expense, and who have to work hard to win even a small quantity of ore. For although ore can usually be found almost anywhere the quantity of it is hardly adequate to pay for the cost of mining. Although there used to be considerable profits made, production has dwindled. There were a steam engine and a moulding machine, but these have been destroyed.

With the exception of nodules of pure copper all the other ore is crushed, washed and riddled in the same manner as lead ore, a most unsuitable method for such a rich and easily smelted material, since it results in the loss of the greater part of the green ore, which is very light.

The smelting furnace is of the reverberatory type like that illustrated in Plate 42 of Schluter's book. It has only one door on the side opposite to the hearth, that is to say under the chimney, and a tapping hole practically in the middle, separate from the stoke hole where the coal is put in. The furnace is built of fire-resistant sandstone and its hearth of the same material, the joints sealed with clay. It is built on a mass of masonry, not a vault, and although this takes longer to heat up it retains its heat longer. Its floor needs to be repaired only once in two months, and replaced only every six months.

When the furnace has been stoked for several hours it is charged through the door under the chimney with about 4 or 5 hundredweights of a mixture of the various kinds of ore, the matte from the previous tapping, crushed coal and slag from the previous smelting, all mixed well together. This mixture is stirred from time to time, and after four hours the slag floating on the surface of the 'bath' is removed with a long iron rabble. So that this slag can be easily taken away it is run into rectangular iron moulds, mounted on little wheels. The furnace is recharged with a similar mixture and this is repeated every four hours for twelve hours, after which time the slag is skimmed off again, and the furnace is then tapped. The

melt flows into two great ingot-moulds of sand, which are connected, but as the copper is heavier it stays in the first, the matte and slag flowing over into the second. The tapping hole is then blocked with a lump of wet sand. The product of a single tapping is about one hundredweight of copper and the same of rich matte. In twenty-four hours some 26 to 30 hundredweights of coal are burned at a cost of some 15-16 shillings.

The slag is crushed and washed to recover any granules of copper which remain.

Since the ore has a low sulphur content, particularly the mountaingreen, which is a kind of copper carbonate (literally copper-limestone) and the copper only needs 'phlogistine' to revive it, it is not surprising that pure metal is obtained from the first melt.

The copper is taken to Derbyshire to refine, and the waste is reckoned to be about 10%.
