### PREFACE TO APPENDIX

From an early stage of the presentation of this study it became apparent that much of the information collected would need to be set out in tabular form, and in order that the details might be easily consulted alongside the primary text, I decided to keep the bigger tables in a separate volume which could be opened at the appropriate page as the text required. This volume, which was originally planned to house the Tables of Patents, of Conveyances, of Nominal Arrears and of Leases, has grown to include other items which, had they been included in the text, would have made it the more difficult to read.

Broadly, the items now contained in the Appendix represent digests of the major evidence from which the argument and conclusions of volume I are derived. The Appendixes are arranged to correspond numerically with the chapters to which they mainly refer; thus Appendix Ia and Ib refer to Chapter I, and since there is no Appendix for Chapter IX, there is no Appendix IX.

Whilst containing some items of general interest, the Appendix is not intended to be self-sufficient, nor to be read continuously from cover to cover, but essentially to be used as a supplement to each successive chapter of the main work.

## Feet of Fine as an indicator of chantry decadence ?

In addition to the leases prior to the dissolution, we might look for any further hint of apprehension about the forthcoming dissolution in any attempts by chantry patrons to hand on their advowsons to others in the years immediately preceding the dissolution. The Yorkshire Feet of Fine (calendared in <u>YASR.</u>ii) record no such transfers before 1521, after which date they may be tabulated as follows:-

As was the case with the leases, the figures indicate that the amount of shift and apprehension was minimal, and in any case the transfers recorded might equally well have been for other valid reasons. The figures are presented here, therefore, primarily as another piece of negative evidence suggesting that calm was maintained before the dissolution.

#### Appendix IIa

## The costs of the chantry surveys:

It is often forgotten that crown commissions on the scale of that for the survey of the chantries cost a great deal to prepare and effect. Commissioners not resident in their appointed area had to travel there; costs of travel, accommodation, messengers and incidental expenses incurred during the commission, with up to 150 persons authorised to take part on the crown's behalf, were necessarily high, and to these must be added the cost of writing up the returns, collecting and transporting the confiscated goods and plate to the Mints, and the further burden on the central administration when all these materials were arriving in London.

The commissioners were not slow to submit their claims for expenses, though the work itself was unpaid. The first applications from Henrician commissioners were already arriving by 20 March 1546, and although we do not have figures for every county, the cost must certainly have exceeded £400. More information survives after the Edwardian commissions. Usually one representative from each area submitted an application, presumably on behalf of all those who had been active about the commission. The first requests came in remarkably early, and all three torkshire claimants had submitted theirs before the end of July 1548: very early in comparison with the requests from the bulk of the other commissions, which continued to come in for many months. Unaccountably, the costs for the second commission seem to have risen dramatically compared with the Henrician figures. The heavy costs of the Gloucestershire and Cumberland commissions reflect the difficulties of administering the more distant counties.

All the Yorkshire claimants were surveyors of the Court of Augmentations and the list shows several more officers of that court among the claimants. With rare exceptions, the payment for these demands was met from the Treasurer's general account, and not from the money raised from the sales of chantry lands themselves.

## Appendix IIc

## The Monastic contribution to the upkeep of certain chantries in 1548 .

(a) The farmers or purchasers of certain monastic lands had continued to pay the stipends of some chantry priests who were dependant on the monasteries. At the dissolution of the chantries these sums had to be paid to the crown as successor to the cantarists. In addition, certain rectories and prebends in private ownership which had contributed such sums to chantries also had to divert them to the crown in the same way as the corporations and manors listed in Appendix IIb. In each case the name of the benefactor is followed by the list of chantries, chapels or parishes to which he gave.

## Appendix IIIc MARIAN RESTORATIONS

Whilst Mary would have liked to restore to the church all the lands which her father and brother had plundered, she was prevented from doing so largely by a hostile Parliament, and by the realisation in her later years that the sale of lands was necessary if the crown was to remain solvent. Some concessions were made, and in particular, several chapels dissolved by Edward but not demolished were brought back into service by Mary, including those on the bridge at Wakefield and on Ouse Bridge, York. The extent of private and secret re-endowment is hard to discover, though we have evidence that the old observances re-appeared at least sporadically throughout the diocese. Parkyn and his intimates restored the mass and trentals 1; at Mansfield Woodhouse, the lady-mass priest at the time of the dissolution:

came & saide masse by stelthe in the Revestry after the law turned about the tyme that the Rising was in Norfolke, and afterwardes fled till Quene Maries tyme, & then ... served againe 2.

Apart from occasional re-endowment, Mary's reign produced a Statute rethinking the crown's attitude to First Fruits and Tenths appropriated by Henry VIII. First fruits were no longer to be paid to the crown; lands granted to the church reserving a tenth to the crown were now absolved from this tenth, though similar land in laymen's hands was to be chargeable still. More important from the point of this study was the restoration to the parishes of those spiritual revenues which had been appropriated. Few chantries had been endowed with tihhes or yearly offerings, but the colleges had found themselves deprived at the dissolution of many such dues, and Mary's Act restored all tithes, oblations and other spiritual dues and offerings which had formerly been appropriated by the crown. Tithe farmers and the like were not displaced but were to render their account to the parish, and no longer to the crown. This re-endowment was at the discretion of the legate, and was designed both to obviate the need for pensions (which could now be met from the restored spiritualities at source) and to improve the parochial finances and ensure a better standard of clergy. The scheme was begun in 1556, and its impact may be seen in the Ministers' Accounts from which large sums formerly due to the crown temporarily disappear, only to be recovered for the crown from the beginning of Elizabeth's reign, following her resumption of items restored by Mary

The significance of this temporary restoration, and indeed the exact method by which it worked, are topics which require further research. Here, I present only a list of the yearly amounts which seem to have been temporarily dropped by the collectors of chantry revenue, and later recovered by Elizabeth:-

## Appendix IVa

Table of Patents for the sale of collegiate and chantry property in the county and diocese of York in the reign of Edward VI.

## EXPLANATORY NOTES :-

The table which follows gives some indication of the size of the problem. It shows the amount of chantry land in the area bought up in patents from 1548 to 1553, though does not seek to account for property in other areas which were included in the same patents.

To economise on space, the abbreviations laid down in General Appendix I have been used in references to the many endowments concerned. Where a parish had only one chantry, I have given only the name of the parish: thus in patent 2, for example, there was only one chantry at Arksey according to the Chantry Certificates, and its total endowment, a yearly value of £2. 2. 4 (nett) was passed in a patent to Beaumont and Gies, rated on behalf of John Holmes.

It was by no means the rule that the whole of any one endowment was bought up in a single patent, so that the value stated should not be regarded as equal to the whole endowment unless followed by the sign ‡ .

An asterisk (\*) indicates that I have traced the property further through conveyances or Ministers' Accounts, and that there is a corresponding reference in either Appendix IV b (Conveyances) or IVc(Nominal arrears). Two asterisks (\*\*) indicate that there are two entries in these subsequent tables.

For ease of cross-reference, both IVb and IVc are arranged in the order of the patents.

# Appendix V a

# Patents for the sale of chantry land under Mary and Elizabeth

Enough material exists for a study of the continued sale of chantry lands beyond the reign of Edward VI, but the operation becomes increasingly trivial and the items discovered increasingly scattered, whilst the source material is not as unanimous as under Edward, so that from supposedly complementary documents variant readings can frequently be found. The day of the bulk purchase was over, and the trend was increasingly towards patents containing only one or two items of chantry property in a given area. Original and enrolled particulars for grant conflict, especially in Mary's reign, the worst example being that the name of Francis Wandesford appears over one request to purchase items which seem eventually to have appeared in no fewer than five separate patents (88,91,93,94,95).

The figures given in these tables are rather more tentative than those in Appendix IV, though the format has been followed as far as possible.

These figures are cited to show that the money raised from the sales was not squandered, and that the government had a good reason for not stopping the sales earlier in order to start the re-endowment of schools with land. It will be noted that the costs of the war are the most noticeable elements in the list above, and that even Household costs are hardly met out of these resources.

# Appendix VIb.

# A note on chantry leases under Mary and Elizabeth :

Under Mary I have found only 11 documents, 5 of them relating to lands of Southwell college which reverted to the crown with the disgrace of the original recipient, John Beaumont. 2 more are reversions of previous known leases, whilst three of the 11 are made out to the sitting tenants.

The annual value of all these leases amounts only to £23. 9. 8 Sources, E 311/3, C.P.R, BM Harley, 239; E315/198; E 401/1204.

Under Elizabeth many more leases survive, but analysis yields little information not contained in the text. Up to the end of 1563, I have found a further 50 or so leases, with the same notable tendency to grant either th the sitting tenant or to a crown servant. Collegiate property is again responsible for the bulk of the material, and the survival of so many leases and farms shows what an enormous administrative burden the dissolution imposed on the crown in the long term.

# Appendix VIc.

The copyhold endowment of certain chantries in the area: The detection of copyhold endowments is not easy. Lacking the 1548 Certificates for both the East riding and the Duchy, we do not know whether the commissioners there listed the copyhold separately from the freehold, as in the West Riding . A comparison of the Chantry Certificates for Duchy areas in 1546 with the Ministers' Accounts after the dissolution reveals that the latter omit much that is included in the former, and it is safe to assume that most of the difference lies in the exclusion of copyhold from reckoning after the dissolution. Enough Duchy Court Rolls survive to prove that this is certainly the case in many manors, and assuming this to be true of the rest of the The copyhold manements area the following list should be accurate. of the provostry of Beverley were extensive, but they seem to have formed an integral part of the farm of the college's property both before and after the dissolution, no copyholders being expropriated, but the lands apparently not being exempt from the dissolution. For the remainder of the East Riding we have to rely on the occasional refusal of tenants to pay rent to the crown for copyhold it wrongly claimed.

Appendix VId

The relationship between customary copyhold rents and the estimated value of land.

Customary copyhold rents bore little relation to the current value of the property. By comparing the alleged rents for certain copyhold plots as shown in the manor court rolls with the yield which the same tenements were said to have made to the chantry priests each year, according to the 1546 Chantry Certificates, we can obtain some idea of the disparity in these values. It is frequently stated concerning chantries supported from copyhold land that the tenants paid their profits to the chantry priest each year, presumably after making a subsistence allowance for themselves from the direct exploitation of their land, so that the actual yearly value of the land must certainly be higher still than the amount said to have been given to the chantry priest. It is not possible to identify all the tenements of 1546 in the court roll for 1549, but for those cases where such identification has proved possible, the results are shown below.

# Appendix VIf The disposal of copyhold land in the manor of Slaidburn

In this manor, instead of the mere court-roll entries furnished by the other Duchy manors in Appendix VIe, we have further details of the prices exacted from tenants who bought back the copyhold of their plots which had formerly supported chantries. Few of these tenements are identifiable as having supported chantries in the county, and it is likely that some supported lights or obits, or perhaps chantries in Lancashire: the document quoted below does not identify the institution supported.

It will be noted that there is great disparity between the rates of purchase of different tenements, and no apparent correlation between the copyhold rent and the purchase price. This may point to individual bargains having been made. The heading of the document is quoted in full, but the descriptions of each tenement have been omitted here, and only the names of tenants, and the values are given:-

Although it is evident from these lists that there were many institutions wholly undeclared to the crown in 1548, the chapels listed were not necessarily scheduled for demolition, and many may have been bona fide chapels of ease, only appearing among the concealment returns because they had certain undeclared funds to support chantries, masses, lamps and the like. Formidable though the lists seem at first sight, their significance is greatly reduced when the amounts in question are considered, which were frequently a matter of only a few pence per year.

# Appendix VIII d The business risks involved in dealing with concealed lands in C. 16

(i) <u>B.M. Landdowne</u> . 105 no. 26 An unsigned and undated memorandum, perhaps from the royal surveyor of crown lands in Northamptonshire, from about the time of rising interest in concealments ( late 1570's-early 80's).

The Incombrances of Concealid landes
He that doethe disclosse yt will have a rewarde and manie times
theye prove not concealid, and then is the rewarde loste.

And the serches whether the matter be cleare or whether they be passed by former letters patents ar very chardgeable.

The chardges of the commission, the commissioners and the Jurie at severall meatinges ar verie greate and manie times little or nothing founde.

And when it is founde if greate speade be not made in the passing of it theare is a lease takin and so all the chardges loste.

Thease Chardges and the Chardges of the letters patents (which ar verie great) beinge borne theare is no lande to be enjoyed without sewting lawe which is greatest chardge of all.

All which Chardges and the greate troble considered no man will deall with concealid landes without he maie have a reasonable rate, and then will all the concealed landes remaine still and so no proffit at all shall growe to her Majestie.

In Northampton Sheire the auncient rente of arrable lande is iii, an Acre or theare aboutes and in my valew they ar for the most parte at ij an Acre, and that maie seme resonable, the Costes & incombrances aforesaide considered.

Yf the rate of pasture grounde seme to little at vj<sup>d</sup> a acre, if it be advanced to xij<sup>d</sup> it maie for the Consideracions aforesaide seme sufficient if your honors will alowe of it.

(ii) Sir James Croft (B.M. Lansdowne, 37 fols. 40,41,42,47.) All the dealers and speculators in concealments must have tried to get the most favourable terms by raising the sort of points in the memorandum above. In the 1580's Croft, comptroller of the Household, was the main speculator, and demanded certain assurances from the queen. First, that the tenants of concealed lands might be assured that there was no recrimination to fear if they wanted to buy the property from the man who discovered it (: unless the speculators could be guaranteed a market, their profits would be hard won). Since the commissioner or speculator has no guarantee of finding anything at all he should be allowed favourable terms. Croft suggests that he be allowed to take a lease of any property he might find, and pay only 1/10 the yearly value as a rent. This was not accepted, and he changed the figure to 1/6th, asking also for a reversion of Duchy of Lancaster lands to the value of £100 p.a. as a reward for his labours.
